What consumes our days? Why do we work? The scripture says we should work for our food, but should it occupy the bulk of our time? We are also

told, "Pray without ceasing." And to "meditate day and night" in God's Word. How do you balance that? Do you ever stop thinking? Then you need never stop meditating and praying. Since it is His power that sustains us, the closer we stay, the more powerful we are. Our thoughts should be consumed with knowing more about God. The more of His wisdom we acquire, the easier life becomes. Father is fully aware of our needs and has already made provision. Our problem is that we do not trust Him to do it. His commands ARE His blessings! They lead us to provision. We scurry about in a frenzy of our own activity trying to get what Father already has waiting for us if we would just obey. Our missionary family of seven needed about \$5000 to return to the U.S. for furlough, and we had no funds. Our monthly income rarely exceeded \$500. By faith, Dad made all the travel reservations. We waited. The day came when, we either had to pay or cancel. As Dad was riding his bicycle to the agent's office to cancel, he decided to make one more stop at the local post office. He had already been there several times earlier in the day. There was a single, thin, dog-eared, airmail letter in the box. It wasn't the letter he was waiting for. He slid it ruefully into his shirt pocket and continued on his journey. As he sat waiting in the agent's office, he decided to read the letter. It was from another missionary lady in Africa. Out slid a check for over \$5000. She had received an inheritance and was moved to send our family a love offering. It had been mailed 3 months earlier! "Your Father knoweth what things ye have need of, before ye ask."
